

4 elements of a *high-impact* NAP

- Strong political commitment
- Inclusive process and coordinated implementation system
- Monitoring and evaluation (SMART)
- Definition and allocation of financial resources

Nationalization and localization of the NAP

- Nationalization: Adapt the recommendations of Res. 1325 that is usually applied in the context of international relations to the demands of the national territory, recognizing and addressing diversities and peculiarities.
- Localization: Equip the executive, legislative and judicial powers of States and Municipalities with practical tools to make the necessary adaptations to the NAP so that it can be implemented efficiently in their locations.

Potential strategies for the NAP

International

- Host global events to discuss the WPS agenda
- Articulation of a Global South/Latin American bloc to discuss and implement a potential Regional Plan

National (application of an intersectional and multisectoral approach)

- Structural Racism
- Disability, autism and neurodiversity
- Threats to indigenous peoples and territories
- Militias and organized crime
- Land grabbing and deforestation
- Domestic and sexual violence / Gender political violence
- Police lethality
- Threats to Peacebuilders and Human Rights Defenders

Transnational

- Business and Human Rights
- Cyber and digital threats
- Climate Emergency
- Terrorism and Extremism
- Human trafficking and sexual exploitation
- Crimes and hate speech

Integration of the NAP with the pillars of Res. 1325/20

Ensure the integration of the 4 fundamental axes of Res. 1325 - prevention, participation, protection, relief and recovery - into the NAP so that the expected results and activities are interdependent and balanced.
